1. OPERATIONAL CONTEXT

- Present briefly possible changes in operational context during the year.

- There has not been discovered noticed any adverse effect upon the people belonging to four communities of ward no. 8 and three of ward no. 2 in Patan Municipality of Baitadi district, twenty six community of Amargadhi Municipality and thirty of Ganyapdhura Rural Municipality of Dadeldhura district where the project intervention has been executed. The hailing and stormy winds befallen on 26th March have created tremendous damage throughout the district and that has caused great destruction of vegetables and edible crops of six communities of Amargadhi Municipality
- During the period from October to December, no adverse effects have been observed in the two Municipalities and one Rural Municipality where the project activities have been implemented, ensuring the well-being of the communities involved.
- The anticipation of rain during the current rainy season raises concerns about the potential for drought if precipitation fails to materialize. Furthermore, local farmers have voiced grievances about the encroachment of wild animals on vegetable cultivation and other crops, exacerbating the challenges faced by the community.

2.2 Progress towards results(outputs)during the <u>year</u>

2.2.1 Narrative analysis

- Summarize briefly how the activities completed during the year have contributed to achievement of project outputs(Detailed information will be given in the table below)

 One year
- Although the project was commenced in January, the follow up of the project activities of the previous year, the annual plan and signing the contract for new project have been accomplished in January, 2023.
- 5 micro-entrepreneurs of Patan Municipality ward no. 8 have been supported with the amount equal to NRs 20 Thousands in order to establish and initiate the business of grocery store, slaughtering, cosmetic, Thela shop, and sewing in coordination with the office of local ward. Likewise, altogether 8 people belonging to local groups including 2 for goat raising, 1 for copper business, 1 for grocery store, 1 for mobile business and 1 for fish farming have been provided with assistance in Amargadhi Municipality. There are altogether 13 people that have earned from 10 to 15 thousands per month through the

- aforementioned business in both municipalities so far. They have also started depositing up to NRs 200 daily and NRs 1000 monthly basis to different financial institutions.
- Three days' training have been conducted for these Micro-entrepreneurs women mainly connected to the groups formed under project before granting financial support in order to strengthen their capacity and promote their positive attitude towards business that consequently engendered economic self-dependence. There were altogether 23 women micro-entrepreneurs as participants in the training.
- With a total number of 39 women including 8 in Salmadi and 5 in Mate of Patan Municipality ward no. 8, 5 in Bhatagaun of ward no. 7, 6 in Khanmada of ward no. 8, 3 in Pokhara of ward no. 7, 6 in Bakande of ward no. 8, 4 in Chachuda of ward no. 6 and 5 in Okhalmuni of ward no. 7 of Amargadhi Municipality have been supported with poly house, drop irrigation and seeds under the project. Similarly, altogether 12 pairs of pigs consisting 4 in ward no 8, Tatar, 2 in ward no. 4, Khalanga and 6 in ward no. 6 Chhachoda Dumada have been distributed among the selected women in Amargadhi Municipality.
- There have been altogether 705 chicks distributed as assistance to 24 women including 4 of ward no. 4 Khalanga, 5 of ward no. 5 Mallo Khalanga, 6 of ward no. 6 Chhachoda, 5 of ward no. 8 Tatar in Amargadhi Municipality and 4 of Meddi and Jaisera of Ganyapdhura Rural Municipality under the scheme of poultry farming.
- Two days' animal husbandry training on commercial farming of pigs, chicken and goats has been provided to 27 women in the cooperative building situated in Amargadhi Municipality.
- With a total number of 5 hand tractors have been granted as support to the groups each comprising ward no. 2 Chaitarkhali and Kafalchauda and ward no. 8, Salmadi of Patan Municipality and ward no. 1, Bhatkanda of Ganyapdhura Rural Municipality. 1, Bakande of Amargadhi Municipality.
- Community Financial Literacy Training has been operated in 15 communities of Amargadhi Municipality and 5 of Patan Municipality. There were total number of 610 participants including 581 women and 29 men in the training. The grant equal to the amount of NRs 1 lakh has been given as seed money to Kailpal Women Development Agricultural Cooperative located in Ganyapdhura Rural Municipality and Bhagwati Agricultural Women Multi-Purpose Cooperative situated in Patan Municipality ward no. 8 Khodpey each. Similarly, 1 Day Training on Loan Management has been accomplished at Bhagwati Agricultural Women Multi-Purpose Cooperative. There were 27 women as participants in the training. Two Days' Training on Designing Business Plan has also been conducted in the same cooperative with the participation of 22 women.
- The managers, chairpersons and project staffs belonging to three cooperatives that have been assisted by the project has also provided with the opportunity to participate in the study excursion of three cooperatives in Kailali with the purpose of promoting the institutional development of cooperatives. There were altogether 11 people including 1 man and 10 women that involved in the tour.
- Three days Refresher REFLECT Training has been conducted with the participation of 9 people. One day orientation on Climate Change and Disaster Management has been accomplished in the 7 schools of Amargadhi Municipality. There were 269 girls, 235 boys and 6 physically disabled students as participants in the orientation
- One IPM training has been conducted in Amargadhi Municipality ward no. 7 Bhatagaun. There were altogether 29 women farmers participating in the training. In the similar way, commercial off-seasonal vegetable production training, with the participation of 55 farmers including 42 males and 13 females, has been conducted in Amargadhi Municipality ward no. 8, Khanmada and ward no. 7 Pokhara. Three weighting scales have been distributed to three communities engaged in commercial vegetable farming including Amargadhi-6, Chhachoda, Amargadhi-11, Finnikot, 1 group in Bakande, 1 in Hatark and 1 in Khalanga of Amargadhi Municipality and 1 in Patan-8, Mate and Kafalchauda and 90 crates have been handed over to 45 women farmers engaging in commercial farming belonging to 7 communities including 5 of Amargadhi Municipality and 2 of Patan Municipality in order to collect fresh vegetables comfortably and securely.
- One day orientation on Gender Equity and Social Inclusion has been accomplished in order to increase the competency along with remedial mechanism on violence against women with the participation of 610 women belonging to 6 communities of Patan Municipality and 14 of Amargadhi Municipality.
- Family Dialogue Program has been carried out altogether in 20 communities including 16 communities incorporating ward no. 4,6,8,9 and 10 1 of Amargadhi Municipality and 4 communities incorporating ward no. 8 and 2 of Patan Municipality. The action plan has been designed on the basis of the precise conclusion obtained from group discussion conducted for addressing the issues of division of work

between men and women, mitigating the women's work load and not limiting the women to handle family affairs but also engaging them in social works. The total number of participants was 42 men and 452 women.

- A dialogue program aiming to discuss on education for children of Dalit haliya family has been conducted in coordination with the offices of Amargadhi Municipality ward no. 6 and Patan Municipality ward no. 8. There were altogether 59 people including 33 women and 26 men participating in the program. The discussion has concluded with consent of ward office's stronger coordination with local body and allocation of budget for the matching fund with the amount equal to NRs. 1 Lakh in order to increase the access of children of Dalit haliya family to higher education.
- Two Days' Training on enhancing the capacity of local level women representatives of Amargadhi Municipality has been accomplished considering the need of the training at the current moment. There was the participation of 30 women in the training.
- Three Days Training on Climate Change and Disaster Management has been conducted in Amargadhi Municipality. It has been accomplished with the participation of 32 men and 3 women all of whom were the representative of Local Government.
- Educational materials have been distributed to the students laborious and belonging to vulnerable community and deprived family in order to continue school and learning. The materials have been distributed to 150 students of Patan and Amargadhi Municipality. The materials included were 30 pieces of copies, 10 peace of pencil, 5 pieces of sharpeners, 5 pieces of eraser, 1 geometric set box, 1 packet shine colour, and 1 school bag that has been handed over to the each students from grade 1 to 10.

In this initiative, although the budget was initially allocated for 25 people, a strategic decision was made to prioritize the communities and schools in the far west, which are at a higher risk of disaster. As a result, simulation orientations were conducted in these high-risk areas, ensuring a targeted and impactful approach to disaster preparedness. 418 participate in this simulation program.

Six water source protection schemes have been successfully constructed, completing the tasks in Amargadhi Municipality Ward No. 11, encompassing Rupali Gawon and Litrigawon, as well as Ward No. 8, covering Tatar, Ward 2 including Kanday and Joishina, and Ward 6 consisting of Chachuda. This accomplishment has directly benefited 137 households by providing access to both drinking water andirrigation facilities.

- There is no such negative impact from project activities on the communities and rights holders. For some actions like banning play cards and alcohol, there was no support from local male counterparts however it was resolved through the support and collaboration of local representatives and police. The positive impact of Reflect class has clearly been felt during this action implementation.

- Out-put: 1 Income of the most vulnerable and marginalized families diversified
 - Three Days Training for micro-entrepreneurs has been conducted. There was participation of 58 women entrepreneurs in the training.
 - 7 micro-entrepreneurs of Patan Municipality ward no. 8 have been granted the amount equal to NRs 20 Thousands in order to establish and initiate the business of grocery store, slaughtering, cosmetic, Thela shop, and sewing in coordination with the office of local wards. Similarly, 23 people have been supported for goat raising, copper business, grocery store, for mobile business and fish farming have been assisted in Amargadhi Municipality in coordination with local community and ward offices. There are altogether 30 people that have been operating the aforementioned business in both municipalities so far.
 - Two days' animal husbandry training on commercial farming of pigs, chicken and goats with the participation of 27 women has been conducted in Amargadhi Municipality.
 - The managers, chairpersons, and staffs belonging to the three cooperatives supported by the project have involved in the observation tour of three cooperatives located in Kailali for the institutional development of the cooperatives. There was the participation of 1 man and 10 women in the tour.

- 15 Days' Training has been conducted in Kathmandu in coordination with Integrated Women Development Agricultural Cooperative. Whereas the project has granted budget required for the training, cooperative institution has purchased the material essential for mushroom production.
- Commercial off-seasonal vegetable farming training has been conducted in ward no. 8 Khanmada and ward no. 7 Pokhara of Amargadhi Municipality. There were total 55 participants including 42 women and 13 men in the training.
- The training has been conducted in coordination with local groups and ward office since July. It has provided 5 people hairdressing and 5 people upgrading sewing training.14 people also accomplished training for light vehicle driving. In the same way, 5 youth of Amargadhi Municipality. 5 have got training on plumbing. 5 youth of Amargadhi got training on mobile repairing, 5 youth of Amargadhi and patan got training on hand tractor repairing.
- This training has been operated in ward no. 7 Bhatagaun and ward no. 8 Khanmada of Amargadhi Municipality. There were 59 women engaged delicately in commercial vegetable farming that participated in the training. The micro-entrepreneur officer of the organization has facilitated the training.
- Altogether 79 women including 22 in Salmadi and Mate of ward no. 8, Patan Municipality, 10 in Bhatagaun of ward no. 7, 6 in Khanmada of ward no. 8, 11 in Bakande of ward no. 8, 3 in Pokhara and 8 in Okhalmuni of ward no. 7, 4 in Malam of ward no. 1, 4 in Chhachoda of ward no. 6 and 5 in Ganyapdhura Rural Municipality have been supported from the project with poly house, drop irrigation and seeds. Similarly, 22 women comprising 9 in Tatar of ward no. 8, 11 in Chhachoda and 2 in Damoda of ward no. 6 have been handed over pair of pigs each as support from the project. 42 women of 6 communities in Amargadhi Municipality have been supported with local chicken.
- Five hand tractors have been granted as assistance to the farmers' community belonging to ward no. 2 Chaitarkhali and Kafalchauda, ward no. 8 Salmadi of Patan Municipality, ward no. 1 Bhatkanda of Ganyapdhura Rural Municipality and ward no. 8 Bakande of Amargadhi Municipality each.
- One day discussion on sustainable agriculture has been conducted participating 50 women of Amargadhi Municipality and Patan Municipality that has been involving in commercial vegetable farming. The activity has been accomplished in coordination with agricultural officer of Amargadhi Municipality.

Output statement 2: Improved capacity of cooperatives to provide financial services.

- One day training on Loan Management with the participation of 27 women has been conducted in Bhagwati Agricultural Women Multi- Purpose Cooperative.
- Community Financial Literacy Training has been operated in 15 communities of Amargadhi Municipality and 5 of Patan Municipality. There were a total of 610 participants including 581 women and 29 men in the training.
- Two Days' Training on Business Plan Design has been accomplished in Bhagwati Agriculture Women Development Cooperative with the participation of 22 women.
- The grant equal to the amount of NRs 1 lakh has been given as seed money to Kailpal Women Development Agricultural Cooperative located in Ganyapdhura Rural Municipality and Bhagwati Agricultural Women Multi-Purpose Cooperative situated in Patan Municipality ward no. 8 Khodpey each. Similarly, essentialfurniturehasbeenoffered to bothcooperatives.
- The manager support has been offered to IDEA Fund of Amargadhi Municipality, Kailpal of Ganyapdhura Rural Municipality and Bhagwati Cooperative of Patan Municipality.

Output statement 3 Marginalized communities and families effectively challenge prevalent GBV and discriminations.

- Three Days REFLECT Training has been accomplished with the participation of 9 people. 6 facilitators have been instructing in 2 communities of Patan, 4 communities of Ganyapdhura and 6 communities of Amargadhi Municipality.
- The facilitators have been provided with remuneration since 1st April as the training completed in March.
- The necessary materials for REFLECT class operation like stationery, register, mattress, tin box, marker and sign colour have been provided.

- One day orientation on Gender Equity and Social Inclusion has been accomplished with the
 participation of 6 communities of Patan Municipality and 14 communities of Amargadhi
 Municipality. The orientation in which 610 women have participated primarily disseminated
 information regarding violence against women.
- The discussion has been conducted on the occurrence of events breaching women rights and prevention of these happenings in the dialogue accomplished with the participation of Deputy Mayor and Women Development Officer of Amargadhi Municipality. There was participation of 43 women in the discussion.
- A discussion program on education for children of Dalit haliya family has been carried out in coordination with the offices of Amargadhi Municipality ward no. 6 and Patan Municipality ward no. 8. There were altogether 59 people including 33 women and 26 men participating in the program.
- Family Dialogue Program has been conducted in 20 communities including 16 communities incorporating ward no. 4,6,8,9 and 10 of Amargadhi Municipality and 4 communities incorporating ward no. 8 and 2 of Patan Municipality. The action plan has been designed on the basis of the emerging conclusion from group discussion carried out on division of work between men and women, mitigating the women's work load and engaging women in the social works but not limiting to family affairs. There were altogether 494 people comprising 42 men and 452 women as participants in the activity.
- Women's Day has been celebrated in coordination with and with the participation of Amargadhi Municipality, Nepal army, District Administration, local government and NGOs on March 8. The celebration of Gaura and Teej considered as the famous women festival in far-western province has been accomplished.
- On the basis of the need of contemporary time, two days' training for increasing capacity of women representatives of Amargadhi Municipality has been accomplished with the participation of 30 women at the district level.
- A discussion program on education for children of Dalit haliya family has been conducted in coordination with the offices of Amargadhi Municipality ward no. 6, 8,2,7 and Patan Municipality ward no. 8. Out of the total 152 people the share of women was 92 and men 60 in the program.
- Educational materials have been distributed to the total 150 students laborious and belonging to vulnerable and deprived family in Patan and Amargadhi Municipality. The materials included were 30 pieces of copies, 10 pieces of pencil, 5 pieces of sharpeners, 5 pieces of eraser, 1 geometric set box, 1 packet shine colour, and 1 school bag that has been handed over to the each students from grade 1 to 8.
- One day orientation on Gender Equity and Social Inclusion has been accomplished in 14 schools
 of Amargadhi Municipality. The advocacy officer of the project facilitated the orientation in
 which there were 478 students' consisting 213 boys, and 265 girls out of them 5 were physically
 disabled students as participants.

Output 4: Enhanced preparedness of vulnerable communities and institutions to respond disasters and crises.

- Three Days Training on Climate Change and Disaster Management for local representatives has been accomplished. There was the participation of 32 women and 3 men in the training.
- In this initiative, although the budget was initially allocated for 25 people, a strategic decision was made to prioritize the communities and schools in the far west, which are at a higher risk of disaster. As a result, simulation orientations were conducted in these high-risk areas, ensuring a targeted and impactful approach to disaster preparedness. 418 participate in this simulation program.
- Six water source protection schemes have been successfully constructed, completing the tasks in Amargadhi Municipality Ward No. 11, encompassing Rupali Gawon and Litrigawon, as well as Ward No. 8, covering Tatar, Ward 2 including Kanday and Joishina, and Ward 6 consisting of Chachuda. This accomplishment has directly benefited 137 households by providing access to both drinking water andirrigation facilities.

- One day orientation on climate change and disaster management has been organized in the 11 schools of Amargadhi Municipality. There were 253 girls, 252 boys and the share of disable out of them was 6.The students has commenced discussing about climate change and its impact on crops with the community members and family member.
- The discussion has been conducted with the representatives of Amargadhi Municipality ward no. 2, 8 and 6 about the rights of community people and the services provided to them by these ward offices. There were altogether 155 people including 142 women and 13 men in the discussion program.
- The project conducted a one-day semi-annual review meeting to assess the progress and impact, with the active participation of Mrs Subarn Pandya representing FCA, alongside dedicated IDeS staff

2.4 Progress towards the overall objective (impact)

Thanks to the project interventions, the target groups, including ex-Haliya, Dalit, and other
marginalized women, have experienced social empowerment and a profound transformation in
their economic status. Consequently, they now lead dignified lives. Additionally, the networks of
rights holders have successfully established a commendable reputation, further solidifying their
positive impact on the community.

2.5 Rights-based approach (RBA)andcross-cutting principles

- Throughout the project implementation, the Integrated Development Society (IDeS) embraced a Human Rights-Based Approach (HRBA) to development, aiming for the comprehensive empowerment of ex-bonded labourers', Dalit individuals, and other marginalized women groups. The targeted beneficiaries were effectively organized, empowered, and mobilized to assertively advocate for their rights and entitlements. Special emphasis was placed on resource mobilization to ensure the success of the initiative. The project also prioritized addressing cross-cutting issues, demonstrating a dedicated effort to achieve the anticipated results.
- In adhering to the Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GESI) mainstreaming guidelines of IDeS, the project prioritized gender and age balance throughout its cycle management. Recognizing the disparities women face in social, economic, political, and cultural dimensions compared to men, the initiative placed a particular emphasis on addressing women's issues first. The project acknowledged and sought to rectify the existing power relations between women and men, aiming to redefine roles, responsibilities, opportunities, and decision-making authority, with a focus on empowering women and challenging their historically subordinate position tomen.

 - The project has been implementing environment friendly programs this year. Project has helped in organic vegetable farming, Pig and chicken farming with modern cages. In order not to have a negative impact on the environment, in addition to supporting the establishment of small industrial businesses, this year, the construction of spring protection for drinking water and irrigation has been completed at 6 locations in Amargadhi Municipality. In addition, cleaning programs have also been conducted by operating child clubs in various schools.

In the current year, there has been an absence of business-generating activities within the community as part of the project management efforts.

The migration of both women and men from the community is attributed to the inadequacies in managing sickness and income, highlighting the pressing need for improved strategies in these areas. livelihoods. Ward 5 of Amargadhi municipality, particularly in the areas of Campus, Hospital Road, and Challis, faces a high risk concerning youth drug use,

necessitating urgent attention and targeted interventions.

High-risk conditions for child marriage persist among the Haliya, Dalit, and marginalized groups, emphasizing the urgent need for targeted interventions and awareness initiatives to address this concerning issue.

The project provides support to both men and women in establishing microenterprises as well as engaging in vegetable and livestock farming, fostering economic empowerment and sustainable

In this year, the project has implemented an awareness program addressing drug abuse and gender-based violence (GBV) in eleven different schools across Amargadhi, aiming to educate and empower students on these critical issues.

The project has conducted an extensive awareness program at the community level, employing methods such as RFLECT sessions, family dialogues, and GBV orientations to effectively disseminate crucial information and promote positive behavioural change within the community.

- The water source protection scheme has proven highly effective for the community, yielding significant returns from a relatively modest investment. With a budget of 150,000, the scheme has successfully provided water facilities to 60 families, showcasing the impactful outcomes achieved through prudent resource allocation.
- The cash support provided by the project for the establishment of small businesses has helped in the establishment of small businesses. Helping entrepreneurs who are still running their business will increase their income and increase their income.
- The implementation of reflect sessions and family dialogue programs has not only alleviated the workload on women but has also played a crucial role in significantly mitigating domestic violence and violence against women, making a substantial and positive contribution to the overall well-being of the community.
- The sub-committee dedicated to reducing violence against women has proven to be highly effective, initiating discussions within the community through cooperative platforms to address and combat violence against women, marking a significant step towards fostering awareness and promoting positive change.
- The three-member complaint and information committee have demonstrated effectiveness in raising awareness among school children about women's violence and sexual abuse, contributing to a safer and more informed environment within the educational setting.
- The training in seasonal vegetable farming has proven to be effective in drawing farmers towards climate-adaptive practices, encouraging their engagement in cultivating vegetables that are well-suited to varying environmental conditions.

Problems.

- There is a problem of wild animals destroying vegetable farming supported by the project.
- There is a problem of not reporting the incidents of child marriage and violence against women in the village houses.
